BULLDOZERS VERSUS ART: A DISCUSSION

The following program was broadcast by Radio Liberty on September 16-17, 1974.

ANNOUNCER: On Sunday, September 15, a group of Moscow artists were forcibly prevented from holding an open-air art show organized without official blessing. Security police drove bull-dozers, sprinkler-wagons and a dump truck through the exhibition. Some of the paintings were torn up, others confiscated and burned. Foreign correspondents who came to view the pictures were forced to leave. Anatolii Kuznetsov, the writer, and Igor' Golomstok, the author of many studies on fine art and, until recently, a senior scientific associate of the Pushkin Art Museum, discussed this event before the microphone in Radio Liberty's London studio.

KUZNETSOV: Just think of it! So much ado about a few pictures which apparently deviated from the permitted norms of socialist realism: the use of brute force, bulldozers, a dump truck, sprinkler-wagons and militiamen against art! Painting would seem to be a real threat to the Soviet authorities. How do you view this affair as a professional art historian, Igor' Naumovich?

GOLOMSHTOK: I once read a story - I don't remember where - about a man who tried to shoot a cat. He emptied a whole magazine at it, but as it lay there, a twitching and screaming mess of blood, the man had the feeling that it was going to jump at him. He panicked and began to feel a mystical terror of the animal. It is my impression that the Soviet leaders have a similar feeling about culture. They have destroyed so much in Russian art over such a long period of time that they now feel the works of Russian art could bear witness against them. I think they have really gone too far in this case. They have convinced themselves that painting is a powerful ideological weapon, that it is a potent means of political struggle against the class enemy, and now they have nightmarish visions of this weapon being turned against them.

As far as I know the Moscow artists who took part in this exhibition, they never set themselves any kind of political goal, and their pictures contain no kind of indictment. The artists are not trying to subvert anyone; they couldn't do that with their pictures, anyway. They are creating values, not trying to undermine anyone's principles.

Publications by the RFE/RL Research Institute

Press Surveys, averaging 15 pages each, consist of original language articles or English translations of the most important articles appearing in the East European press. Such surveys were made for Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland, and Romania.

Information Items are based on interviews made in Western Europe with visitors and refugees from Eastern Europe.

Situation Reports contain summaries of current developments in Eastern Europe. These reports were prepared by the national units twice a week.

Background Reports are special studies providing perspectives on current events and trends in the communist world. The reports were issued on a regular basis, as well as in response to sudden developments, such as government reshuffle or an unannounced meeting of communist leaders.

Information for researchers

Open Society Archives is an open-access facility committed to making materials available to users on equal terms of access.

On-site reference services are provided in the Research Room, every work-day from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Every researcher must obtain a researcher identification card at the OSA Reception Desk which is valid for two years. Research status is available to anyone at least 16 years old.

The Archives provides **copying services** in the following formats: electrostatic reproductions, videotape and audiotape, and photographs.

The **OSA website** is designed to provide basic description of OSA reference services available online, and other information of interest to **off-site researchers** (including the OSA Restriction Statement, citation recommendations etc.).

General reference or research questions may be sent via e-mail, regular mail, fax or phone (see information on back cover). OSA staff does not perform research on behalf of researchers. However, researchers may request that copies of documents relevant to their research interest be delivered by express mail or regular mail, or by fax.

OSA offers a variety of **grants** to scholars, archivists, journalists, artists and others exploring the fields covered by OSA's holdings.

Research grants are offered on a competitive basis to support scholars who wish to pursue research in OSA's holdings. These grants provide travel to and from Budapest, a modest stipend, and accommodation in Budapest for a maximum research period of two months. The application, including a research description plan, C.V., and two letters of recommendation should be sent to the Research Grant Selection Committee, OSA. The Selection Committee normally meets four times a year in March, June, September and December.

OSA regularly offers **other grants** to scholars, artists or journalists who wish to carry out projects related to topics covered by the Archives' programs, and exhibitions to be hosted by Galeria Centralis.
